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“ I worked with Carol for many years, and through her I got to know her husband, son and daughter-in-law very well. We often joked that she was my work mom, and often she was the first person I spoke with each day when I got to my office. I was seriously injured once at work, and although she had already gone home for the day, she drove back to the hospital and sat with my wife for hours, on her own time, while I was being treated. As I was coming out of the anesthesia hours later, she and my wife were standing there and started telling me how they did all they could, but they had to amputate my arm. Moments later, I realized that they were just kidding me, my arm was still there, and I was ultimately fine, but that bit of dark humor actually made me feel a whole lot better. She and I dealt with a lot of things in our years working together, some of them quite serious, and I was always thankful she was there with me.
